Augusta County 4-H is a program of Virginia Cooperative Extension, which is a part of Virginia Tech. 4-H is the nation's largest youth development organization, empowering six million young people throughout the United States (4-h.org). Augusta County 4-H will award a one-time \$1,000 scholarship to one dedicated 4-H member. Scholarship applications from graduating high school seniors intent on pursuing a post-secondary degree or certificate will be considered eligible for the award.

The scholarship will be awarded in memory of John Blair Riley. John B. Riley was born in Staunton, Virginia on August 10, 1947 and was very active in 4-H as a youth. He showed sheep and steers and participated in county fairs. He also received the highest level 4-H award by being named a 4-H All Star. Dr. Riley graduated from Virginia Tech with a bachelor's and master's degree in agricultural and applied economics. He was a professor of agricultural economics at Kansas State University and later served as the dean of the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences and Natural Resources at the University of Tennessee.

General Information

1. Applicant must be a resident of Augusta County, Virginia.
2. Applicant must be a current active 4-H member.
3. The scholarship will be awarded based on 4-H dedication, participation, and essays.
4. Scholarship applications and the payment form must be turned into the Augusta Extension Office by Friday, April 29th, 2022. Applications and payment form can also be submitted electronically by emailing both to eaedwards@vt.edu. Winner will be notified by May 25th, 2022.
5. Candidate must be accepted and intending to enroll at an accredited post-secondary educational program including college, university or technical school.
6. The scholarship is to be used by the recipient's 20th birthday. Scholarships not used by the recipient's 20th birthday will revert back into the scholarship fund. Funds may not be transferred to another student.
7. The scholarship cannot be refunded.
8. Earnings will be paid directly to the student's account at the accredited educational institution of his/her choice. After enrolling in school complete the Scholarship Payment Request Form and submit to the school's registrar's office.
9. Augusta County 4-H Agent will annually appoint a selection committee. The Augusta County 4-H Agent, with recommendations from the committee, has final decision-making authority.
